



FREQUENTLY ASK QUESTIONS (FAQ) from: www.Tripod.org

(About the captions (or subtitles) on the movie films.)

The Deaf and Hard of Hearing community has been talking about, and wondering why there are no captions (or subtitles) with black background as used to be the case. Here is the answer to the question below.

Q.) Why are the words in white, sometimes they are so hard to read?

A.) The process by which captions (or subtitles) are applied to a motion picture print is by use of a <u>laser</u>, which engraves the text onto each individual frame of the film. Burning away the emulsion layer of the film, allowing white light from the projector to pass through the film and project white captions on the screen. <u>Addition of a drop shadow or gray or black box surrounding the titles would require a very costly optical process.</u>



Fire Station No. 7






Station No. 7 was opened in 1899 with housing horse-drawn equipment, a steam engine, and a horse wagon. Then in the 1920's these pieces were replaced with motorized trucks. It was one of the city's busiest firehouses for 70 years before it closed in 1969. The firefighters moved to a new facility on Elgin Street at Austin. In two years from now a new firehouse will be built on Travis and Haley. The photo above on the right that used to be Fire Station #7 is now the Houston Fire Museum.

FRANCIS HUMBERSTONE MACKENZIE SIXTH LORD SEAFORTH 1754-1815

No one expected him to win, but Francis Humberstone MacKenzie was running for Parliament. It was 1784 and Scottish clan loyalty was very strong. MacKenzie—"Lord MacKenzie," the British called him—was determined to replace Lord McLeod. If he won the election, Lord MacKenzie would help the British rule a growing empire.

MacKenzie had become chief of the noble MacKenzie clan in 1781. Everyone knew him. To talk to him, they used fingerspelling, as MacKenzie had been deaf since birth.

When he was a little boy, MacKenzie went to an oral school in Edinburgh. He learned to speak a little bit, but he much preferred to talk with his friends using signs and fingerspelling. He taught all the hearing people he knew the finger alphabet and they often used it to converse with him.

One day he was invited to the house of Lord and Lady Melville for a dinner party. Before MacKenzie arrived, two of Lady Melville's guests entered the home and met each other just outside of the dining room. Having learned that there was a deaf dinner guest, each assumed the other was the deaf guest. They sat down and started talking to each other in fingerspelling.

When Lady Melville walked in and saw her hearing friends fingerspelling with each other, she burst out laughing.

"I thought you were deaf," each surprised guest told the other. The moment ended with lots of laughter. When MacKenzie arrived, he had quite a laugh, too.

MacKenzie wrote many letters to friends who lived far away. The letters, friendly and articulate, have been preserved to this day.

When the election was over, MacKenzie was declared the winner. He probably became the first deaf individual to win an elective office, and he was just beginning his career.

MacKenzie served in Parliament until 1790. Then he retired and returned home to earn money.

When war broke out against France, MacKenzie raised an army of soldiers in his Scottish homeland. They formed the 78th Regiment of Foot, Rose-Shire Militia. MacKenzie himself was the Lieutenant-Colonel Commanding. In 1794, he added another battalion of soldiers. In 1808, he rose to the rank of Lieutenant General. He ran for Parliament again and was re-elected by a large margin. When he returned to Parliament, he gave strong support to the government. In appreciation, the government named him the Sixth Lord of Seaforth.

In 1808, MacKenzie, now the Sixth Lord Seaforth, became governor of Barbados. He served there for several years. He is known for trying to improve the conditions of the slaves.


Afterward, he returned to Britain. Sadly, he ran out of money and had to sell his house and much of his land. He had a wife, four sons and six daughters. MacKenzie died in 1814.
