## Are You One of the 50 Million People Who Has Gum Disease?

The Truth About Periodontal Disease

Periodontal disease, also known as gum disease, is an infection of the tissues surrounding and supporting the teeth. It is a very serious disease that can result in tooth loss, but it is generally painless, so you might not know you even have it. According to the American Academy of Periodontology, consequences of this disease may include the following: A.) Permanent tooth loss B.) Higher risk of stroke and heart attack. 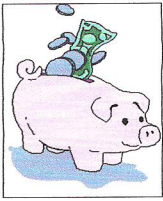

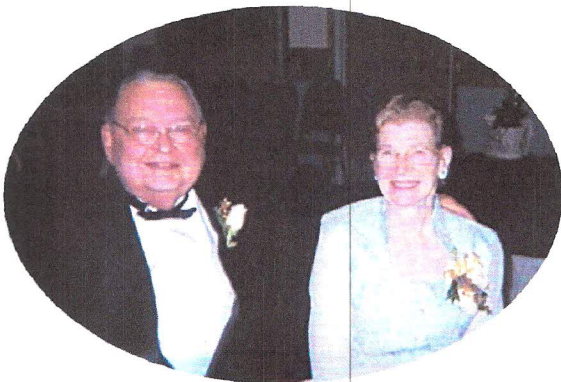

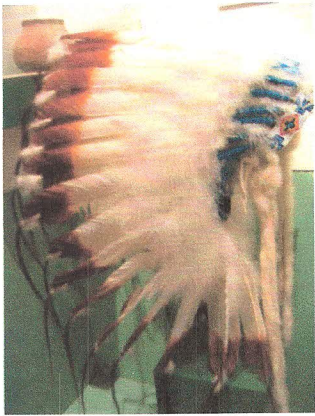

In Livingston, they visited ← **Polk County Memorial Museum, Jonas Davis Cabin** →, **Heritage House** circa 1890's and **W.T. Carter & Brothers Locomotive Train** circa 1911. Polk



County Memorial Museum's include photos, letters, history. It also includes glass displays of the Native Americans & Pioneers, the Civil War life in the Timber County, and Main Street Collection. Jonas Davis and his wife, Hortense built their Cabin in 1933. He was one of the last Pakana Muskogee Indians to reside in Polk County.

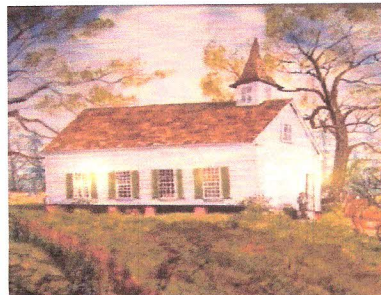
archives contain over 1500 items that diaries and four published books on local history.




## Skateboarder dies after being hit by SUV



Rory Dean and a friend were having a sleepover Tuesday when they decided to skateboard to a nearby convenience store for a late-night Slurpee.

At about 11:10 pm, Dean, an eighth-grader at Damonte Ranch High School, was trying to catch up to his friend who had skated ahead and was waiting near the 7-Eleven at 1445 Geiger Frade Road. "His friend noticed a car coming and yelled out to him," said Trooper Harbey Brown, Nevada Highway Patrol Accident Reconstructionist. "Just as he yelled, the boy was hit."

Dean, 13, of Reno, was skating in the northbound lane of Nevada 341 when he was hit from behind and died at the scene. Brown described the location as rural and dark. Dean was wearing blue jeans, a burgundy shirt and a baseball cap. "I don't know if better lighting would have prevented this accident, but it certainly would have helped," Brown said.

Dean was struck by the right front fender of a 1999 Jeep Cherokee driven by Joann Fate, 59, of Virginia City, who was on her way to work at a grocery store, said Trooper Chuck Allen, NHP spokesman.

Alcohol, drugs and speed were not believed to be factors, Allen said. Fate was not cited. The accident is still under investigation. "She realized she hit something and stopped not too far from where (Dean's) friend was and said, 'I think I hit something.'" Allen said. "The boy said, 'I think you hit my friend.'"

Brown said Fate noticed Dean's friend standing near the store and her attention was focused on him to make sure he was not going to enter the roadway.

Accident investigators said it's likely the noise from skateboarding on the asphalt prevented Dean from hearing the oncoming Jeep. After Dean was struck, only his baseball cap and a shoe were seen in the road, Allen said. With help from witnesses inside the store, Fate and the friend used a flashlight and found Dean's body in a drainage ditch beside the road.

Fate was not at fault because Dean was skateboarding in the travel lane, Allen said. She submitted to a voluntary blood test to screen for alcohol and drugs. Investigators said Fate told them she did not see Dean in the dark. Allen said there is "virtually no shoulder" at the location.



## **Officer Randy Melton:**

Officer Melton has been in law enforcement for 32 years and has worked with the deaf and hard of hearing communities for the past 17 years. He is a strong advocate for the deaf and hard of hearing.

In 1987 Officer Melton became the first in the nation full time community liaison officer between law enforcement and the deaf and hard of hearing. He immediately saw that his fellow law enforcement officers needed training about the deaf/hard of hearing communities.

For this reason he has been training his fellow law enforcement officers for the past 15 years. He is certified in 18 different state Police Officers Standards and Training organizations through out the United States and to date has trained officers in 23 of the 50 U.S. states.

He developed two videos to be used in law enforcement training. These videos are used in over 200 law enforcement agencies around the world to help train their officers to respond to the needs of the deaf and hard of hearing communities.

He developed and implemented the first of its kind college level accredited American Sign Language course for law enforcement officers in the United States.

Officer Melton saw the need for the deaf and hard of hearing communities to let law enforcement officers know of their disability in a quick and efficient manner. For this reason he developed a visor-card, for deaf and hard of hearing people. Upon request he gladly, shares his visor-card with his fellow law enforcement officers. To date his visor-card is being given out to deaf and hard of hearing people by 57 different law enforcement agencies in the United States and by two foreign law enforcement agencies.

Officer Melton also saw the need for all law enforcement officers to know some law enforcement signs so he developed a pocket size communication card for officers to carry with them while on patrol. These communication cards are now being used by 77 law enforcement agencies in the United States and 6 foreign law enforcement agencies.

Officer Melton says of all his awards, honors, and commendations he has received over the years he cherishes one above all others. This honor was, being given his very own "sign name" by the deaf community.

Paulsboro man found murdered; suspect held

A 60-year old man was found beaten to death in a home in the first block of Roosevelt Street early Saturday. Police went to the home about 2 AM to investigate a report of a loud disturbance. Inside the home, police found the body of the victim, whose name was being withheld pending notification of his family.

The victim had struggled with his attacker during an apparent burglary, or robbery, or both, police said. The man was fatally beaten and was struck several times with a blunt object, the prosecutor's spokesman said.

Kevin Spragg Jr., 21, of Broad Street, Gibbstown, was arrested about 3:25 AM and charged with the murder, a spokesman for Gloucester County Prosecutor Sean Dalton said Saturday. Details about his arrest were not released.

Spragg also was charged with robbery, burglary, theft, and possession of a weapon for an unlawful purpose. He was sent to the Gloucester County Jail on \$250,000 full cash bail.

The spokesman said because of the ongoing investigation, further details about the slaying could not be released immediately.

### **Deaf Woman Killed by Fatal Hit & Run**

August 15, 2004

MT. PLEASANT, UT, USA - Mt. Pleasant Police Investigate a Fatal Hit and Run. Sixty-four-year-old Madge Snedeger was killed, Monday when her 87-year-old neighbor's car hit her. The woman, who was deaf, was hit from behind as she walked down the street to get her mail.

Police say the man has a driver's license, but is nearly blind. In fact he turned around and went home after the crash. Snedeger was found lying in the road dead. The driver faces hit and run charges perhaps, negligent homicide.

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## **Future Security Measures - The Ears Have It**

Recently Britain's University of Leicester and K9 Forensic Services Limited in North Hampton ran a trial on ears. Fifteen-hundred ears were scanned and each one of them was found to be unique. That is why "ear prints" might be the up and coming security measure of the future. They work something like fingerprints-with ears 18 points are

compared. So, what's the benefit? Ears can be viewed at a distance by security cameras, say in airports, and in time a global database of ears could be gathered and built. This method of identification will work at high speed and likely be very accurate. So potentially we might be lining up for photos of our ears in the future.

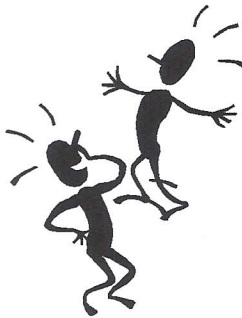

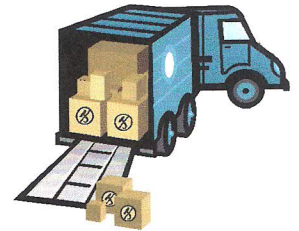
