n my mother-in-law's old trunk, I found some treasured valentines (right). Two of them were dated Feb. 14, 1912, and Feb. 14, 1915, but one look at the pictures of children and ladies, amid all the cupids and flowers, would have proclaimed them from the early 1900s without any dates.

My mother-in-law, Alice, and her sister, Freda, were "courtin' age" when these valentines were sent, and some of them may have had deep meaning—depending on how they viewed the sender. At any rate, they had valued them enough to keep them through the years.

The messages surely were of another era. One was:

Sweeter than a rose, fairer than a pearl, purer than a lily, my own sweet girl.

Another read:

My go-between Saint Valentine, will bring these lines to thee. Glance them o'er and tell me, Dear, that you'll be true to me.

Then one declared:


Sweeter than the breath of violets sweet is the love of my heart I lay at your feet.

And this message sounds like another time:

What shall love's keepsake be, a rose—a ring; token that's fair to see, nay none of these, love mine I'd send to you—take from me,

Valentine, my heart so true.

Style in messages and designs on valentine cards has surely changed since these girls of the early



1900s received theirs. The hearts of girls today would hardly be stirred to be addressed as "My own winsome girl." But the message carried

today, whether by flowers, candy or a clever verse on a card is still the same—"Happy Valentine's Day to my special friend!" *

Legend of the Valentine

The problem was an old damage on my right knee, and a new coronary slant was implanted in my knee and leg and then I was given three additional pints of blood. Some of the dead tissue was removed and then stitched up. I went home, but I had to return to the hospital on Dec. 3 to have the dead tissue removed and then I went home on Dec. 5. Someone from Home Heath Care came to check on me to change dressings and gauges. Now I am improving a lot.

Our family would like to thank all of you who have reached out to us in sympathy through your cards, notes, and donations following the death of my father. My parents were preparing to attend the annual Deaf Expo in Ontario (southern California). The motor home was in the street, with the tires on the right side up on blocks. My mother was inside the motor home, preparing to gently drive the RV off the blocks, which she had done many times. My father was standing outside in front of the motor home. We assume that the automatic choke was causing the engine to rev full force, because when it was put into D/drive, it unexpectedly lurched, and hit my father. He died almost instantly following the impact. He was **NOT** dragged, and he was **NOT** run over by the tires as some people have suggested.

Irma Lee Garland Leibold of New Jersey, passed away of massive heart attack Thursday, December 24, 1998 at home. She was 78 years old. She was born in Rayville, LA and lived in Louisiana for 40 years then in Bound Brook for 15 years. She later moved Bradley Gardens Section of Bridgewater and lived there 20 years before moving to Raritan Borugh three years ago. She was a graduate of Louisiana State School for the Deaf in Baton Rouge in 1942. On Dec. 15th her family and friends attended a party given by her children to celebrate 78th Birthday. She was a homemaker. She was an avid cook, book reader and sports fan. Her husband, Walter of 48 years died in 1993. She is survived by three sons and one daughter and two brothers living in Louisiana. She was buried on Dec. 30, 1998 in her hometown Somerville, N.J.

Joyce Eastham Herron passed away in her hometown of Dallas, Georgia on October 11, 1998 due to a heart problem which she had for sometimes, She was born in Amarillo, Texas on March 4, 1932, attended TSD where she graduated in 1949. She was well known as the only girl graduating from the class of all boys. She attended Gallaudet University from the fall of 1949 until she graduated in 1952. She married Duwayne Dukes (from the Georgia School for the Deaf at Cave Springs) on May 22, 1952, had four children, Robert W. (born March 20, 1953, Laurie Wood (born Sept. 21, 1955), David O. (born December 12, 1959) and Lilah Smith (born May 11, 1961. Married Ernest Herron on Aug. 15, 1976, but he died on Jan. 23, 1992. Joyce graduated from Georgia State University in 1974 and started teaching at the Georgia School for the Deaf and retired in October 1944. She spent her retirement years living with daughter Lilah in Dallas, GA. She was involved with the Crusselle Freeman Church of the Deaf in Atlanta for many years. She taught Sunday School, served as assistant Music Director and then became the director until her death. She was buried beside Ernest In East Atlanta. She had seven grandchildren.

Truitt Saunders passed away on January 15, 1999 in California. He had cancer of prostate, tumor of throat and liver problem. His son passed away from Aids on January 11, 1999. Truitt used to be physical education teacher at TSD from 1954 to 1962.

Fred J. Loring of Dallas passed away while he took a nap on Sunday morning January 17, 1999. He was born July 27, 1918 in San Antonio, Texas. He was a charter member of the Deaf Bowling Hall of Fame and retired from National Casket Company in 1972. 
The deaf school campuses we toured were in Austin, TX; Staunbon, VA; ASD in CT, Iowa and Neb.
