

Ernest Marshall

From Deaf People in History.com

Ernest Marshall was an imaginative and innovative filmmaker (and an engaging signer and storyteller) whose shoestring-budgeted films are fascinating and valuable documents —showcasing talented Deaf performers using ASL before it was even considered a language. Third-generation Deaf, he was born in Poughkeepsie and graduated from NYSD (Fanwood) in 1931. For 38 years, he worked as an interior decorator at Manhattan's Mid-City Hotel. Off duty, he participated in local Deaf-theater groups-a pool of talent he utilized for his films. Between 1937 and 1962, he produced 7 feature films and 4 shorts, all at his own expense, directing most of them. His work received enthusiastically by Deaf-club audiences, but remained largely unknown to the general public until fairly recently, when his work was "rediscovered" and he was accorded belated recognition for his contributions to the social and life of the Deaf—and American communities. He passed away on September 19, 1999.

Country-Style Scrambled Eggs

8 bacon strips, diced

2 cups diced red potatoes

½ cup chopped onion

½ cup chopped green pepper

8 eggs

½ cup milk

1 tsp salt

½ tsp pepper

1 cup (4 oz) shredded cheddar cheese

In a large skillet, cook bacon until crisp. Using a slotted spoon, remove bacon to paper towels to drain. Cook and stir potatoes in drippings over medium heat for 12 minutes or until tender. Add onion and green pepper. Cook and stir for 3-4 minutes or until crisp-tender; drain. Stir in the diced bacon. In a large bowl, whisk the eggs, milk, salt and pepper; add to skillet. Cook and stir until eggs are completely set. Sprinkle with cheese and let stand until melted. Serves 4 people.

Robert H. Weitbrecht

A native of Orange, CA, Robert Weitbrecht showed an early bent for science, especially astronomy. An accomplished physicist and inventor, he received his Bachelor's in Astronomy from University of California at Berkeley in 1942, and his Master's in Astronomy at University of Chicago in 1952. In 1964, Dr. James C. Marsters, a deaf orthodontist in Pasadena, CA sent him a TTY and asked him to set up a system so they could communicate with each other. They formed a partnership with Andrew Saks, a deaf mechanical engineerbusinessman. Weitbrecht developed an acoustic coupler, which enabled typewritten communication over telephone lines, using TTY's. He acquired a patent and formed a company to manufacture couplers. Although none of the partners profited financially from their venture, their invention has profound repercussions for the Deaf community. Weitbrecht passed away on May 19, 1983.
