

He even polished shoes at the state fair of Minnesota. These early lessons in selling made him comfortable around the hearing and made him so confident about selling that he had his own business selling automobile parts and tools for over thirty-two years in Fort Worth and Houston. He retired in 1990, at the age of seventy-four, when he and Rosie moved to Austin, Texas. However, he continued to sell as he helped Rosie with her TTY business.

At age of eighty-eight, Joe still sells at the side of Rosie in her TTY business and Joe smiles with pride as he talks about his three doctors –Jerry, David, and Steve. Indeed, Joe is a very proud grandfather!

#### Field Trip:

On Friday, March 12, 2004, a group of Houston Deaf Senior Citizens had a field trip to El Campo and Historic Danevang, TX on a beautiful, nice sunny day. They toured and went sight-seeing to several of El Campo's 24 professionally-painted murals, and the Museum of Natural History (a collection of exotic and indigenous animals in dioramas of their natural habitats). Then we toured at Danevang Historic Culture Center – a three-acre museum complex, the only existing Danish settlement in Texas. It is Danish tradition to have Christmas tree standing in the middle and stays there up to Easter time. There is a dance in the Danish Tradition that forms three or four circles or rings around the Christmas tree, everyone joined hand-in-hand, while singing and dancing in opposite directions! 1941-1945 World War II - Hundreds of deaf people in United States were active "on the home front" during the war to build bombs, bullets, planes, and tanks in defense industries. Deaf people worked in all capacities. Some were professional chemists; some were young men and women with no specific skills who came in from the surrounding farms. At least 40 companies reported in various newspapers that they were highly satisfied with their deaf workers.

1964 Robert Weitbrecht, A deaf man introduced an invention to help the deaf to speak on the phone. The invention was an electronic device called an acoustic coupler that enables typewritten communication over the telephone through the use of a teletypewriter (TTD). In 1982, there were over 150,000 TTY sets in the U.S. Not only are they in deaf people's homes, but in many public places, businesses, airline reservation desks, police, fire departments, hospitals and schools. Because of this invention, deaf people can now one step closer towards equal enjoyment of the technological luxuries and necessities of modern culture.

#### AN UNDERGROUND LANGUAGE

The Washington Post, February 24th edition, ran a story about the nushu, or women's script, as practiced by the women of China years ago. The women, not permitted at that time to aspire for high educational levels, developed their own secret script language - the nushu.

This language is dying, but a there is a determination among groups of women to keep it going. Pretty much reminds us of the deaf, in the years after the infamous 1880 Milan Convention that forbade use of sign language in the classrooms. The ASL became our underground language for many years. It was not until late 20th century when learning ASL became fashionable.






#### SENIOR MOMENTS.....
