

DEAF CITIZEN BECAME A MEMBER OF LIONS CLUB: by Mary Corley

Ace Robertson is from Alabama, but is now a resident of San Antonio, TX and a Board member of the Senior Citizen also. Some of you may know him. He is a former Gallaudet student, but he received his degree from Rice University in Houston. Then he joined the Lion Club.

Here is an interesting story about Ace and his interest in the Lions Club:

Ace Robertson became a probationary member of the Highland Hills Lions Club. He went to a regional convention of Lions International and the annual statewide convention of Lions International. He said it is very interesting to meet and talk to people from all walks of life: bankers, CPA's, doctors, truck drivers, dishwashers, all with one purpose.... to make the world a better place for everyone. The best part for Ace was meeting folks from all over Texas. There are at present, invitations from Corpus Christi, Del Rio, Laredo, Wichita Falls, and San Angelo on the table for a visit later this year to talk to prospective deaf members. As far as can be found Ace is the first deaf member in Texas in the history of the Lions. Last June was big for Ace: Induction ceremonies made him a full Lion along with two other "cubs". A really heart-felt "thank you" is owed to Jose Echeverri, one of our board members and one of the owners of GPM Life Insurance. Jose was the sponsor and driving force behind all of this and remains a close and valued friend to Ace. There is the Lions Youth Ranch in Kerrville with 900 rolling acres with buildings for dorms, supervisor lodgings, administrative offices, gym and cafeteria. This camp was offered to the Lions when they didn't have enough money, A rich man offered to put up the money for escrow. His check was never cashed and is on display in their "museum".

They welcome kids with diabetes, handicapped, deaf, blind, and combinations, plus any thing else you can come up with for the camp. Lets give Ace a standing ovation and congratulate him on his being a member of the Lions Club and the first deaf Lion. Something to be really proud of and who knows, he could be well known in history some day.

4 eggs


1 large onion, chopped






Field Trip to Round Top



Houston Deaf Senior Citizens take a field trip to Round Top to tour several antique stores.



The bus driver, Lou, discovers this interesting sign, "Round Top – Public school 1878-1912 and Colored school 1912-1953."


Last stop at an antique store the group found many interesting and reasonably-priced things to buy. This picture was taken just before leaving for Houston.



Calbraith Perry Rodgers (1879-1912) "I Endure, I Conquer."



Cal Rodgers with Vin Fiz at Sheepshead Bay, Brooklyn, N.Y., September 17, 1911

Calbraith Perry Rodgers, severely deafened at age 6 thanks scarlet to learned to fly at the Wright Brothers' aviation school in Dayton, Ohio, during the 1911. of summer Immediately thereafter he participated in big international air meet at Chicago, where he won a prize for flying the longest during the nine-day event.

He then accepted the challenge of newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst, who offered \$50,000

to the first pilot to fly across America. On September 17, Cal took off in Vin Fiz, his Wright Model EX, from the Sheepshead Bay race track in Brooklyn, N.Y. Over the next six weeks he landed 73 times. Half a dozen of those landings were complete crashes, after which Vin Fiz had to be rebuilt from the ground up.

In October the time limit for the Hearst prize ran out, but the stubborn Rodgers pressed on. He survived the explosion of his engine over the California desert and limped into Pasadena, the official last stop of the flight, on November 5.

He wanted to complete his journey to the Pacific Ocean, and on December 12 flew to Long Beach, where he at last dipped Vin Fiz's skids into the surf.

On April 3, 1912, he was killed when his airplane dove into the surf off Long Beach. He was the 127th pilot to die since records had been kept. He is buried in Pittsburgh and is remembered by pilots everywhere.
