Andrew Foster
(1925-1987)

DID YOU KNOW?

Andrew Foster was born in Ensley, Alabama and became the first Black Deaf person to earn a bachelor's degree from Gallaudet University and the first to earn a master's degree from Eastern Michigan University. After earning another master's from Seattle Pacific Christian College, he went to Africa in 1957. There he encountered cultures so oppressive of deaf people that parents often hid their deaf children at home or abandoned them altogether. Hearing missionaries told Foster that deaf children didn't even exist in Africa. But he found deaf children and established schools for them--31 in all. Before he was done, he established schools in countries including Benin, Congo, Chad, Ivory Coast, Kenya, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, and Cameroon. For much of his life he spent six months of the year in Africa establishing schools and the other six months in the United State raising money to support these schools. In 1970 Gallaudet granted him an honorary doctor of humane letter in recognition of his accomplishment. Andrew Foster met his untimely death in a plane crash in 1987 and the Black Deaf community lost an extraordinary leader.

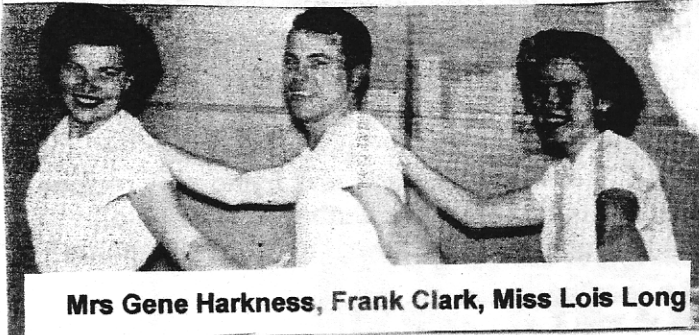

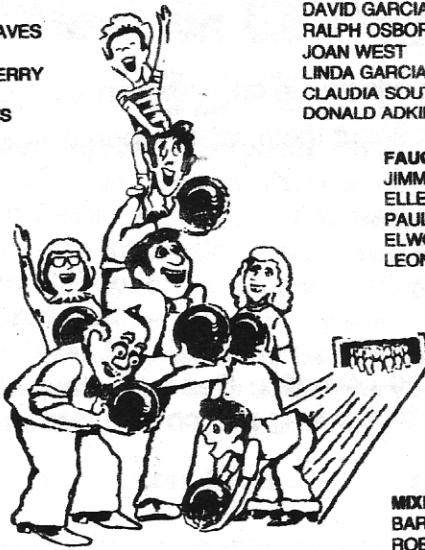

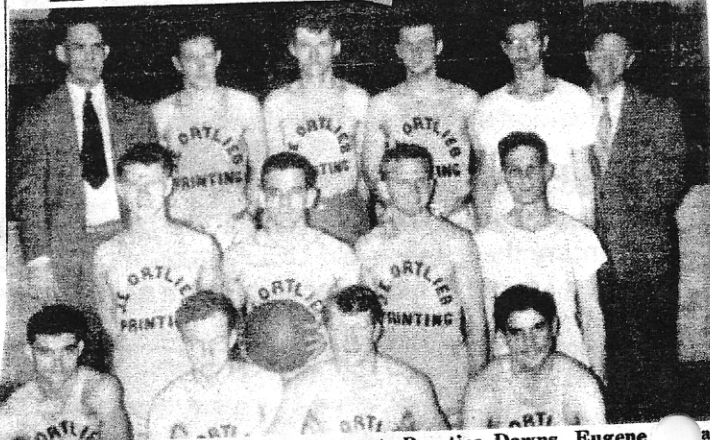

JEFFREY FLOAT WINS 1978 AAAD ATHLETE OF YEAR AWARD, FIRST TWO-TIMER

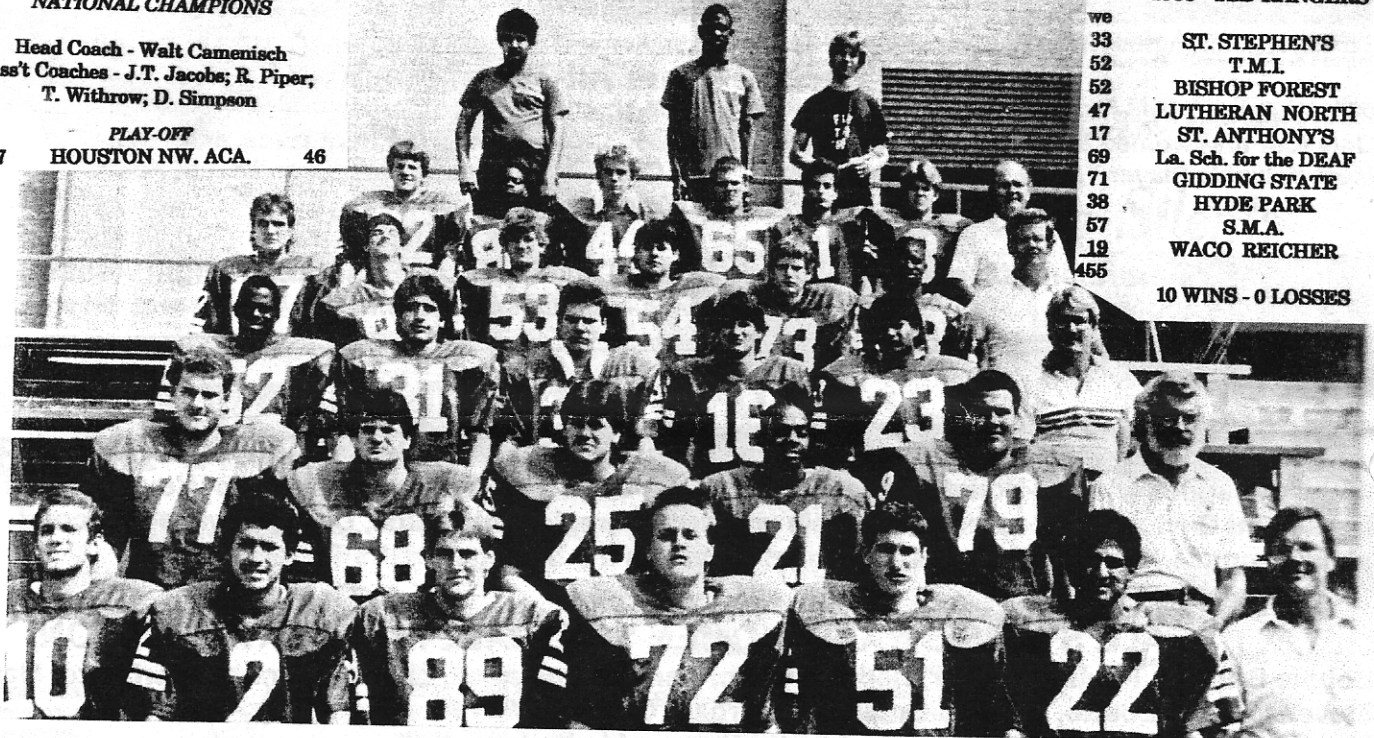
Jeffrey Float, now a freshman at University of Southern California and a stand out on the Trojan swimming team, is the recipient of the 1978 American Athletic Association of the Deaf athlete of the year award. Jeffrey won it previously in 1977, and it is the first time in AAAD history that an athlete won this award back to back.

Jeffrey was the first swimmer to compete in hearing international meets. He won the 400 meter free style AAU championships at Woodlands, Texas. He placed 3rd in 400 meter individual medley to help United States beat Russia at Austin, Texas. In the World Swimming Championships, he placed 2nd in the 400 meters at West Berlin, West Germany. He is a leading candidate for the 1980 Olympics at Moscow, Russia.

1986-- Sixth National Championship, first 10 wins season ever, and the third school for the deaf that ever achieved the feat. The team was probably the most well-balanced team as 16 different players scored. The total points were 455 to 98.

1986-- The usage of drum to aid the offense at the snap was introduced to T.S.D. The idea was used at the Gallaudet University and a few other schools.
