

She graduated from Texas School for the Deaf in Austin, and later became a teacher at her Alma Mater for a couple of years before moving back to Dallas as a full time librarian in the Dallas Library system until her retirement.

Lucille was a dedicated and imaginative lady of the Deaf community and she was more likely a mother to the Deaf youngsters. She had been involved in the Dallas Deaf Community, the old Dallas Silent Club, and the forerunner of Dallas Association of the Deaf/Dallas Community Center for the Deaf. She was selected by the Deaf Community as a Woman of the Year.

She was a member of Dallas Auxiliary Frat #141 of the National Fraternal Society of the Deaf, and Dal-Tar Deaf Lioness Club. Also, she was a deaf activist and staunch supporter of Texas Association of the Deaf and National Association of the Deaf.

Since her health was being failure, she was placed at the assisted living quarters. She received her visitors from the Tejas Deaf Seniors Club of Dallas that constantly cheered her up until her death.

W. H.STARK HOUSE MUSEUM

W. H. Stark, a successful & wealthy businessman, and his wife, Miriam Lutcher moved into their 1894 Victoria home. This house is three stories with 15 rooms and today it still stands with its original furniture, rugs, family portraits, lace curtains, silver, ceramics, glass, woodwork, & lighting. Also many beautiful crystals, some things with Ivory, and 36 sets of dishes are displayed in the house. Miriam's hobby was collecting dolls, angels and unique urns from other countries. What a remarkable sight! Unfortunately, taking pictures inside of the house is prohibited, but the group really enjoyed touring this beautiful house.

Heritage house was built in 1902 by J. O. Sims. It was occupied only by members of the Sims Family until 1977. The house was sold to the City of Orange who then donated it to The Heritage House of Orange County Association, Inc. When she was a typist, her boss beckoned her to follow him to Hermann Hospital. At the time no one would tell her what happened to her husband, Roy (he was working in a company that did book binding and the pressuring part fell on both of his hands and lost his hands). She wanted to see him, and doctors & nurses kept her back, because they did not know how to help her brace for the awful truth. When she finally saw Roy, he was thrashing about, his arms held high to keep blood from spurting out. She shuddered and cried. Roy asked her if she still love him and she said, "I do love you!" He gave a wan smile. That happened two years and seven months after they were married, and they have stayed together for 44 more years.

We have a true heroine in our midst and a true believer of God's trust and love. She followed her marriage vows, for better or worse until death did them part.

Jenice Wells Remembers...

This story is from when there were 11 people living in Jenice's house per parents, aunt and uncle, and her children.

One time when Jenice had finished reading a pile of comic books, she looked around and found no one in the house. She looked outside but no one was there either. After a while, a neighbor across a cornfield heard her loud sobs, came and brought her over to their shack. The kindly neighbor gave her an apple, which helped only for a short while. She still bawled. Where were her folks?

Meanwhile, her brother was looking around in the car, they were on their way to visit a cousin who was a cop. Her brother could not find Jenice in the car, so he tapped his father on the shoulder, and informed him that she was missing. A check proved this to be true, and father ordered all to get off except Jenice's uncle who went back with him to the house. With great relief, they found her at the neighbor's house.

Glass Baking Pans

Glass pans used for baking allow foods to brown quicker than the metal varieties. It is a good idea to lower the oven temperature by 15 degrees to prevent over-browning. This may increase the overall cooking time slightly. Most recipes give alternative tests for doneness (firm center, lightly browned top, etc.) along with the estimated cooking time.

Medical Update

HOPE FOR SKIN CANCER PATIENTS - Melanoma will strike 53,000 Americans this year and kill about 7400, more than any other form of skin cancer. Now scientists report in the British science journal Nature that they have identified a gene that, when damaged, may contribute to melanoma. The researchers hope their discovery will lead to the development of drugs that can target the mutated gene—and stop cancer cells from proliferating.
