Did You Know?

This series traces people, products and traditions back to their sometimes unusual and interesting roots.

I MET Florence "Dinghy" Spalding Sharp last December when she'd been invited to speak to a group of children at the opening of a toy exhibit in a Michigan museum.

This charming woman radiated the spirit of Christmas, and there's good reason for that—she's the great-granddaughter of Clement Clarke Moore, creator of one of the world's most beloved poems, *The Night Before Christmas*

Dinghy was invited to share the story of her famous ancestor's poem...but first she had to explain to the children how she got her unusual nickname—it came from her love of a small boat when she was a child. Then she shared the fascinating background behind "Papa" Moore's poem:

Papa created the poem after a trip to town on Christmas Eve in 1822. He was on his way to buy a Christmas goose, but his mind was on his 6-year-old daughter, Charity.

His heart was heavy for the child, who was ill with tuberculosis. Her one request for a Christmas gift was a new story. Her request wasn't unusual in those days—from presents to decorations, Christmas was a homemade holiday.

Inspiration in Town

Papa wanted to create something that would cheer and delight Charity. While in town, he happened to visit a local woodcutter named Peter.

Peter had a white beard, often wore a red parka and smoked a Danish pipe. Moreover, he liked telling stories to the local children, including one about a man in Denmark named St. Nicholas who loved children

so much he presented them gifts on their birthdays.

Inspired by his daughter's need and Peter's stories, Clement Moore created A Visit of St. Nicholas. I was surprised to learn that the poem's modern-day title, The Night Before Christmas, was not Moore's own. But a bigger surprise was learning that he never wrote the poem down.



'Night Before Christmas' Was Never Meant for Publication

Despite the urging of family members, he refused to do so, reciting it only from memory. It wasn't published

until a cousin secretly sent it to the Troy, New York Sentinel in 1823.

Published anonymously, it became a huge success. For the next 25 years, it was published annually, but neither Clement Moore nor any of his heirs ever received any money for the poem. "That's why we refer to Papa as the poem's 'creator' and not its author," Dinghy explained.

Popularity Was Pestering

Clement Moore was upset over the publication of his poem, and it was many years before he allowed the guilty cousin back into his home. Not being paid didn't bother him—it was the fact the poem had become famous!

"You see," Dinghy told us, "Clement Moore was a renowned scholar. He taught Greek, Latin and ancient Hebrew at Columbia University. Papa wished to be known for his scholarly work—not for a Christmas story composed for his daughter."

The packed room was hushed as Dinghy began reciting her great-greatgrandfather's poem. Her style of recitation had been carefully preserved in her family down through the years.


At age 8, Dinghy learned how to recite the poem from her grandfather, who'd been taught by *his* father, who'd been taught by Clement Moore himself. "You can't get any closer to the original work than that," she smiled.

When Dinghy finished her stirring recital of A Visit of St. Nicholas, silence prevailed for a few seconds before the loud applause began. For me, and everyone else there, it was a moving experience

Somehow, the animation and drama that Dinghy put into the poem's delivery—plus the knowledge that this was the way Clement Moore had chosen to delight his daughter more than 170 years ago, captivated us all.

DIFFERENT VERSIONS OF HAMBURGER

The stories in the last issue of Houston Deaf Senior Citizens Newsletter were very interesting to me; yet I was surprised at such stories. About 50 years ago I read an interesting tale of how we got the word "hamburger" for our favorite sandwich. Since then I thought what I read was the only version of how we got that word.

What I read was that a ship from Hamburg, Germany docked at New York City in the 1880's. When the passengers debarked, they went to the nearest restaurant. They could not find in the menu there the kind of meat they wanted, so they explained to the cooks to first grind beef and make patties before being fried. Then these passengers asked for loaves of bread and then sliced them. After that, they put the fried ground meat between two slices.

When the cooks asked them what the name of the sandwich was they did not know. Probably it was because the cooks could not understand German while the passengers could not understand English, resulting in confusion.

The cooks gave up and asked with simple gestures where they came from. The passengers said they came from Hamburg, Germany, but the cooks still could not understand them, so they pointed to the nearby ship marked "Hamburg".

Finally the cook caught it and then decided to label the unknown sandwich "Hamburger" and added it to their regular menu. All of a sudden it became popular with those who patronized that restaurant.

How hamburger became famous on a nation-wide scale was when it was sold at Chicago World's Fair in 1893. It was noticed that slices of bread was messy so they used buns instead.

That is how hamburger came into being (I thought).
