


SEPTEMBER 11, 2002: A WAY TO HONOR OUR NATION TOGETHER

On Friday, July 26th Rubin and I went to Baton Rouge, visiting my dying 93 years old mother. Next day Rubin's left leg was cramped and pained. We were planned to stay there longer than the weekend, but instead we returned home early Sunday. On Monday he was sent to the emergency in Kingswood Hospital. A doctor found that his leg had neither blood nor oxygen, which caused his left leg to become cold. The doctor took more tests. Finally, Rubin was transferred to Methodist Hospital in Houston. A surgeon cathered and pulled the clots out in the leg, while watching out for Rubin's weak heart. After the surgery, the leg became warm, but now his left foot drops down. He had been trained how to walk with the walker. The surgeon determined it is best for Rubin to take heart pills instead of putting a defibrillator in the chest. He finally came home on August 9th. A physical therapist comes to our house three times a week. His progress goes well.

He was instructed to be cautious and to gradually phase in physical activity to allow the catheter insertion area to heal. His blood pressure continues to be in the 140's when checked.





Karen Clifton remembers by Esther Brownalenoir

When her parents traveled over the world, they collected souvenirs. Karen got an idea, which won her first place of a Halloween contest in 1967 at Wisconsin School for the Deaf, in Delavan. Among the souvenirs were a paper dress (remember How popular they were?), and a long cigarette holder. It was perfect for a Phyllis Diller disguise; plus she loved that funny and happy comedian. She teased, powdered, and sprayed her dirty blond hair so it would look like the frizzy hair that Phyllis had, but what a time she had to comb and wash her very tangled hair!

Do you remember Mr. Kenneth Huff who was principal at Louisiana School for the Deaf, Baton Rouge? Do you remember when he was trying to hush his secretary Mrs. Boles' long conversations with his staff? Know the scissor sign language to hush up? Well, Kenneth took a big scissor, meaning to demonstrate to Mrs. Boles, but instead cut his tongue! He had to go to the hospital to have his bleeding tongue taken care of.

When it was time to go home for that first Thanksgiving, Pernella's parents and Sister Gloria came by to pick her up. They didn't recognize her! They kept on saying it was not Pernella until they saw her hands. Why? Before she ever went to L.S.D., she would ask, with a homemade sign, for peanuts and syrup on bread. That she would eat every day. But at school, supervisors did not understand that sign. There was no other food but the food they prepared: vegetables, meats, fruits, etc. Pernella had no choice. She was hungry, so she ate what they gave her and had become a chubby girl!

When Janice and her brother, Curtis Robinson, about 7 and 11 years old respectively, were walking on their farm, her brother happened to look around and sighted a snorting and pawing bull behind. He grabbed her hands and both ran for their lives. They still do not know how they were able to climb over the sharp barbed wire fence without getting a scratch!

Field trip to New Braunfels

August 16, 2002

What a relief! 26 Houston Deaf Senior Citizen made it to New Braunfels the day after a severe thunderstorm and flooded streets in Houston. It was really an enjoyable trip for the group. They visited two historical places: Sophienburg Museum and Museum of Texas Handmade Furniture.



New Braunfels was founded by Prince Carl of Solms Braunfels and brought many German immigrants to make a new home in Texas. Prince Carl planned to bring Lady Sophia to Texas and build a Sophia's Castle. Unfortunately, Sophia didn't agree to come to Texas so Prince Carl returned to his home land and married the Lady Sophia, but never returned to Texas.

← Inside the museum are displaying Naegelins Bakery, an orphanage, the pharmacy, a general store, a doctors office, a shoemaker, a master cabinet maker, a barbershop, a post office and much more – all bringing back the memories of the first city to tax its citizens to provide these services.




In the museum a chest displaying some belongings an immigrant packed for his trip. Whether rich or poor, many immigrants tried to bring everything that might be helpful to them in the new world. In addition to clothing, bedding and cooking utensils the craftsmen brought the tools of their trade.



A variety of black veil designs that immigrant ladies wore to funerals. In the early times they had to wear the veil covering their faces in time of mourning.

What a beautiful and unique wreath! The immigrant ladies created an unusual art to make this wreath with real hair. If no hair was available, then horse hair was used.



Museum of Texas Handmade Furniture

Bill and Nan Dillen collected Texas handmade furniture and restored the Breustedit House (see the picture on the right). There are over 75 original beautiful furniture items handmade in Texas dating from the mid-19th century to the late 1860's in this museum. The museum also features a display of home furnishings and cabinetmaker tools used by early settlers of Texas. English ironstone is exhibited in the house. The Dillens gave the collections and the home to the community after their death.



Deaf History

Texas School for the Deaf

School Mascot



The T.S.D. football team in 1894 was called simply *Texas School for the Deaf*. From 1895 to 1898, it was labeled the *Roses*, named after the school superintendent, A.T. Rose.

After Superintendent A.T. Rose resigned in 1899, the T.S.D. football team was called *Deaf and Dumb*. At that time the school was called *Texas School for the Deaf and Dumb* during the turn of the century.

Prior to the 1910's, several names had been used when the T.S.D. football squad. They were *Deaf and Dumb*, *Dummies*, *Scrubs*, and *Deaf Mutes*. From 1910 to 1920, the team was called *Lone Stars*.

It is unclear why the *Scrubs* was used. However, whenever the name was used, it was connected to the second team. It may have meant a junior team. But, again, as noted several times in *The Lone Star*, the first team usually consisted of only the first 11 players and the second team the second 11 players. It was assumed that the second team may have been part of the varsity team. Sometimes, there were games set up for the second teams only. One way or another, they were called by these names above.

After years of various names being used, the *Silents* was accepted by the media and all interested parties. There was not any document that indicated the football squad was called other than the *Silents* Post-1920's. The *Silents* remained from 1921 to 1953, when the name was changed to *Rangers* which has remained to the present.

At a recent meeting of newly established Boys, Athletic Association, one of the first official Acts of that body was to adopt a name to replace the "Silents". Great pains were taken to choose a name that would be easily recognized as "Texan" in origin and at the same time easily drawn for illustration purposes. The great and glorious fame of the Texas Rangers furnished a very appealing name which was immediately found favorable by the large majority of the students.

After it was carried in the voting, the newspaper and other interested parties were informed of the change. The name was welcomed immediately and warmly.

Rangers has been used affectionately by students and faculty alike. There have been a large number of various illustrations of the *Ranger*, it appears to be here to stay!

TSD Drama Club Performance will be held at R. L. Davis Auditorium on Friday, September 27 at 7:30 PM.




