

Kenneth Pacetti Sr., ex-justice of peace: submitted by Audrey Leger-Wright

Mary Ella Redman's sister, Shirley's ex-husband, Kenneth Pacetti Sr., who served two decades as a Harris County justice of the peace, died of cancer Tuesday, October 22nd at Park Plaza Hospice in Houston. He was 75. Pacetti was born July 2, 1927, in Florida. His parents moved to Galveston just a few weeks later and then to Houston around the time he started elementary school. At 16, he dropped out of Jeff Davis High School, lying about his age so he could enlist in the U.S. Navy. He was stationed aboard the USS Card during World War II. After the war, he returned to Houston, earned his GED, and completed a bachelor's degree in history at the University of Houston. He started law school there but left to join the Air Force during the Korean War, working in the Office of Special Investigations.

Shirley Pacetti, his wife at the time, said he developed heart problems and his doctor told him to get out of private practice because it was causing too much stress.

Shirley said he was a reluctant judge at first. "He said many times, 'I just never thought I'd enjoy being on the bench." She said. "But he loved it."

National Museum of Funeral History in Houston is the world's largest funeral memorabilia. Many fascinating artifacts and information on a variety of political and famous people, including Princess Grace of Morocco, John F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King, Frank Sinatra, Kirk Alyn, the original superman, Presidential funerals, etc are exhibited. The museum also has a collection of antique horse-drawn hearses as early as 1832 to other variety of funeral service vehicles.



Thanksgiving and Christmas is around the corner

POTATO & SPINACH CASSEROLE

6 to 8 potatoes, peeled, cooked and mashed
10 oz. pkg. Frozen Chopped Spinach, thawed and drained
8 oz. Sour Cream
1/4 cup Butter, softened

2 Tbs. Chives, chopped2 Tsp. Salt¼ Tsp. Pepper1 cup Shredded Cheddar Cheese

In a large bowl, combine all ingredients except cheese. Spoon into a greased 2 –quart casserole dish.

Bake, uncovered, at 400 ° for 15 minutes.

Top with cheese and bake 5 minutes longer.

1 Pkg. (1¼ oz) Taco Seasoning Mix

1 Bunch Green Onions 2 to 3 Medium Tomatoes

1 Small Can (about 2 oz) Sliced Black

Olives

1 Pkg. (8 oz) Shredded Cheddar Cheese

On a round pizza pan or large round plate: spreads bean dip, layer mashed California Avocados over the bean dip and sprinkle with lemon juice. Mix sour cream, mayonnaise and taco seasoning mix then spread over avocados. Chop green onions and tomatoes for the fourth and fifth layers. Spread olives on top, sprinkle with cheddar cheese and garnish with sliced avocados. All you need are Chips to Dip....

Deaf History

The Kelly Stevens Collection

Dr. Kelly Haygood Stevens (1896-1991)

Texas – Artist- Teacher – Inspiration to the Deaf and the Hearing

Born in Mexia, Texas, Kelly Stevens became deaf due to scarlet fever at the age of five. When he was later asked about this "handicap", he replied, "It has opened many doors to a bigger life."

This "bigger life" deserves to be remembered and told in a detailed, heavily illustrated book to remind young and old that a positive attitude, a search for adventures and knowledge, and showing affection to people and animals, enriches everyone's life.

Steven's formal education began 1907 at the School for the Deaf in Austin, TX, where he stayed for eight years and developed his artistic talent under the guidance of the wife of acclaimed artist W.H. Huddle.

He received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Gallaudet College in Washington, D.C. and a Master of Arts degree from Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge. Later in life Gallaudet honored him with a "doctor honoris causa."

His career as teacher of art took him to the School for the Deaf in Trenton, New Jersey, and the School for the Deaf in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

His major interest, however, was always with painting and with improving his skills and knowledge. Throughout his long life he painted in many distinctly different styles and media, in many places of the world and covering many topics, from the delicate water color of a geisha to the bold oil canvasses of Arizona Indians and Chilean landscapes to the bright flower arrangements of his later years, when his eyesight was fading away. He considered a mural in the First United Methodist Church in Mexia, Texas, one of his best works.

He studied with well known artists including Jean Hanau and Louis Francois Biloul in Paris, Wayman Adams in Mexico and the brothers Zubiaurre in Spain and Chile.

While traveling in Europe and Central and South America, he was always conscious of Texas being his home. During the last 45 years of his life he lived in Austin, Texas, where he restored the historic German Free School building which he used as his home. He built a collection of classic art – painting as well as porcelain, silver and furniture – much of which he then donated to various universities, the University of Texas among them, where a room in the Harry Ransom Center is named after him. Many international deaf artists were helped by his purchase of their painting for placement in various galleries and museums.

Kelly Stevens never married and was by no measure an angel in human disguise, but his home was always filled with people who enjoyed his company, learned from him and endured the noisy presence of his many dachshunds. After he had passed away at age 95, he was genuinely missed by those who knew him, so many of them young people who had sensed the affection he had for them and which he had accepted from them.

Neither a politician nor a general, Kelly Stevens was a great Texan, one of those people who leave their mark in the real history of Texas.

His home and most of his possessions, including paintings and boxes of personal letters and photos, now belong to the German-Texan Heritage Society headquartered in Austin.
