What is the difference between wolf and wolfdog?

Wolves in the wild are elusive and dogs are generally friendly. Dog scat doesn't usually contain fur and is generally smaller than a wolf's. Wolves howl more than they bark, and for dogs, it is the other way around. Wolves are much larger with far less variety than dogs.

The head of a wolf is larger and longer than a dog and there is a gradual stop, or angle between the eyes and front of the skull, unlike what is seen in dogs.

Wolf paws are generally larger, averaging 4 1/2 to 5 inches in length and width, and legs are longer in relation to body size.

The chest of a wolf is narrow and deep and the front legs are relatively close together.

The tail of a wolf never curls upward or touches the ground.

A wolf usually has golden eyes, sometimes brown or green, but never blue like a husky's, although wolf pups have deep blue eyes. Pups are only born once a year between March and June, unlike dogs that can give birth at any time of the year.

Wolf coats are coarse and long, thicker in the winter. Wolves look thinner and kind of scruffy in the warmer months due to loss of their undercoat. Their coats do not show any sharp delineation in coat color or pattern. https://www.quora.com/How-can-you-tell-wolf-dogs-and-wolves-apart

Quality Improvement (QI) Project Summary Need Volunteers



INTRODUCTION: Hello! My name is Colleen Manning, and I am a family nurse practitioner and doctoral student at UTHealth Cizik School of Nursing. I have chosen to work with the Deaf community at HDSCLF for my QI project (my parents, Kevin and

Diane Finnegan, are members).

QI PROJECT GOAL: I will create an ASL video on advance care planning (ACP) to help teach and motivate you to participate in decision-making. I will show you how to use an easy online website to complete your advance directive (AD) if you want to - Texas Advance Health Directive.

WHAT IS ACP? This is when you discuss and prepare for future decisions about your medical care IF you become seriously ill or unable to communicate your wishes (for example, if you suffered a bad heart attack and you have a breathing tube and medicine to keep you asleep—you cannot communicate for yourself because you are sleeping).

WHAT IS AN AD? Advance directives are official papers or legal documents you share with your healthcare team. The AD will have the contact information of your chosen 'decision maker.' The person you are allowing to speak on your behalf only IF you cannot communicate.

WHO CAN PARTICIPATE? Any Deaf adults who use sign language to communicate. You will need to attend monthly meetings (approximately 4-6 meetings) and be willing to complete short surveys evaluating the ASL video I made.

Before the project starts, I will collect your age and gender and ask you to answer yes or no- Do you already have an advance directive? I will NEVER use or share your name or email with anyone else to communicate with you about this project. I will not ask for a copy of your AD; it is up to you if you want to complete one during the project.

WHEN? The project will start in August once UTHealth approves. The project should end in January 2024 or earlier.

WHERE? I want to meet with the project members monthly at MMSC on the same day as HDSCLF meetings (2nd Wednesday of each month). The group will decide the time. I expect project meetings will be at most 30 minutes.



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WHY? There is insufficient ASL healthcare information for Deaf people to access, use, and learn from. Most ACP and AD material is written at an 11th-grade reading level; this is too high for the general public to use. I am a medical professional and have a tough time reading the language. Previous studies show that it is essential to work with Deaf people when creating anything new that they will use — this way, the information you are learning about has been developed and reviewed by Deaf people and meets their satisfaction.

PROJECT TIME

March/April: I attend HDSCLF meetings to inform and sign up members to join.

August: My project can start after approval by UTHealth.

August/November: I meet with you monthly to review the ASL video and collect survey information.

November/December: the ASL interpreter approves the final video, and CC is added; I will analyze the survey data.

January: Share the final video and present the project video and results with HDSCLF at an upcoming meeting.
